A VERY RARE ECLIPSE

On the day following our monthly meeting, a rare "hydrid" eclipse of the Sun will take place. It will begin off the coast of New Zealand and will finish about 3½ hours later in Venezuela. The term *hybrid* is used to denote the fact that for the central portion of the track the eclipse will be **total**, but for the earlier and later portions it will be **annular**. This rare situation arises because on April 8th the apparent diameters of the Sun and Moon are almost precisely equal, but the portion of the Earth's surface that experiences the middle of the eclipse is a few thousand kilometres nearer to the Moon, and so the Moon appears slightly larger than it does from the earlier and later parts of the track.

THE PLANETS

Mercury will reach its greatest western elongation on April 26th, when it will be 27° from the Sun. This is splendid for southern hemisphere observers, but not very good for us in the UK, because the planet lies south of the Sun and so will not climb very high in the morning twilight. It will therefore be fairly difficult to observe.

Venus remains almost unobservable this month, as it passed through superior conjunction on the last day of March.

Mars continues to draw slowly away from the Sun in the morning sky, but in spite of this it is still very difficult to observe from the Northern Hemisphere because of its southerly position. From the UK the planet will be only 10° above the horizon as twilight begins.

Jupiter reaches opposition on April 3rd, when it will be a magnitude -2.4 object in the constellation of Virgo. It will therefore be observable throughout the night, though not best-placed for observers at our latitude. Jupiter will in fact be occulted by the Moon on April 21st, as seen from some parts of the southern hemisphere.

Saturn continues to be well placed for observation after sunset, as it is still fairly high in the sky at this time.

Uranus and Neptune continue to be for all intents and purposes unobservable this month.

METEORS

The Virginids reach their maximum activity (about 5 meteors per hour) around April 10th, but the best of the April meteors, the Lyrids, reach their maximum activity close to the Full Moon, and so observation is unfavourable this year.

COMET MACHHOLZ

Comet 2004 Q2 (Machholz) continues to be observable through binoculars. It is circumpolar, moving through Draco and heading towards the Plough. It is now about magnitude 8.

Scarborough and District Astronomical Society Fifth Summer Star Festival, 2005

Friday August 5th to Monday August 8th (Three nights observing) Adderstone Field, Dalby Forest, in the North York Moors National Park

We invite you to come and join us for three nights observing in an elevated dark site within the stunning Dalby Forest on the foothills of the North York Moors. Our site is within easy reach of Pickering, with its steam railway, and the seaside resorts of Scarborough, Whitby and Filey. There are many beautiful walks in the area, both within the forest itself and further afield. This area is well known for its many and varied attractions. There is a large and well-drained field for camping, (tents and caravans) with portable toilets.

The cost for the weekend will be £17 per adult, £5 for 5-16 year-olds, with children under 5, free. We are sorry to have to increase the adult fee, but the toilets will be more expensive next year following the takeover of the original suppliers. There is a limit to the number of guests we can accommodate last year we had to turn people away at the end, so **book early** and avoid disappointment! Please also note that any bookings accepted after July 7th, space permitting, will cost £20 / £6 to cover last-minute arrangements."

This fee includes a forest pass to enable you to take advantage of the forest facilities, as well as a 'wine and nibbles' get-together on the Friday evening to welcome you to Dalby Forest. Please book ahead so that you can receive your pass – otherwise you may be asked to pay the toll as you enter the forest.

Again we will hold one of our famous team 'Astromind' competitions in the communal marquee and speakers will be organised for various times during the event. If there is anyone amongst you who would like to volunteer to talk or demonstrate at other times, we would love to hear from you! A number of trade stands will also be on site for part or all of the time.

The Low Dalby site is now being re-developed, and the new Visitor Centre complex, with community room is already taking shape. We are told that this phase should be completed by March – but let's add a couple of months and say it should be ready in time for Starfest 2005!

3rd Kielder Forest Star Camp Northumberland, 8 – 11 September
