IMPORTANT ASTRONOMICAL EVENTS OF 2004 *visible from Britain*

- **MAY 4:** Total eclipse of the Moon (at moonrise)
- **JUNE 8:** Transit of Venus across the Sun
- **OCTOBER 28:** Total eclipse of the Moon

These are *as certain*, as they say, *as tomorrow's sunrise*. Less certain, but equally exciting, is the prospect of two naked eye comets in the late spring (although only one of them is likely to be favourable from our latitude).

Also, three of our best meteor showers, the Perseids (August), Leonids (November) and Geminids (December) are *favourable* this year.

THE PLANETS

Mercury is not well placed for observation in February, but may be glimpsed low in the morning twilight the beginning of the month.

Venus continues to grow in prominence in the evening sky as its declination steadily becomes less negative. The planet crosses the celestial equator early in the month, and by the end of February is 10° north of it. Its magnitude is now -4, and its elongation from the Sun increases to 44° by the end of the month. It is 3° north of the Moon on the 23^{rd} .

Mars, still fading, sets at around midnight. It is now in the constellation of Aries, and only about 6 arcseconds in diameter. The Moon passes within one degree of Mars on the 26th.

Jupiter is a brilliant object, magnitude -2.4, now rising in the evening. Opposition occurs early next month. It is 3° south of the Moon on the 8^{th} .

Saturn continues to be the gem in Gemini. It is fading in brightness, down to magnitude -0.1 by the close of the month. It is 4° south of the Moon on the 3rd.

Uranus and **Neptune** both pass through conjunction this month and are therefore unobservable.

METEORS?

February is the one month of the year with no significant meteor shower activity!

Note: The best occasions to look for the ISS are when it has a large maximum altitude, such as 6.20 pm on 1^{st} Feb, 6.51 pm on the 2^{nd} , 5.48 pm on the 3^{rd} , and 6.19 pm on the 4^{th} .

Don't be surprised if the times differ a little from the published ones, as the orbit of the ISS continually undergoes minor changes.
