PROSPECTS FOR THE HUBBLE SERVICING MISSION

NASA has given the go-ahead for the space shuttle Endeavour to be launched on November 14th on a mission to the International Space Station. However, work to test a component needed by the Hubble Space Telescope will not be completed in time to be launched aboard the shuttle Atlantis next February. That flight, the Hubble Servicing Mission 4, was originally was scheduled to be launched on October 14th this year, but it was delayed when a critical science data relay unit aboard the observatory failed in September. NASA decided to delay the HST flight until mid-February to give engineers time to test replacement electronic gear, but problems with the equipment will require additional work before it is ready for use, so it does not seem that the long-awaited servicing of Hubble will take place before May at the earliest.

PHASES OF THE MOON

First Quarter occurs two hours before dawn on November 6th
Full Moon occurs an hour before dawn on the 13th
Last Quarter occurs on the evening of the 19th
New Moon occurs an hour after sunset on the 27th

OCCULTATION OF THE PLEIADES

The Moon, a few hours after Full, will pass in front of the open cluster of the Pleiades on November 13th. Alcyone, the brightest of the Pleiades, will disappear from view at about 7.15 pm, and reappear shortly before 8.15 pm.

THE PLANETS

You may be able to catch sight of **Mercury** in the morning sky at the beginning of November, as it rises about an hour before the Sun. Thereafter it moves back toward the Sun, and reaches superior conjunction on November 25th.

Venus has been an evening star for over four months now, yet has been difficult to spot due to its low altitude and fairly close proximity to the Sun. But watch during November, as it gradually increases in prominence, although it will still be low down in the constellation of Sagittarius. On the last day of the month it will be a brilliant magnitude -4 object two degrees south of the fainter (magnitude -2) Jupiter.

Mars is unobservable this month.

Jupiter is becoming increasingly difficult to observe, as it gets closer to the Sun in the evening sky. However, it is still fairly easy to spot at the beginning of November, and will be close to the much brighter Venus at the close of the month (see above).

Saturn is now drawing away from the Sun in the morning sky, and at the start of November rises about 2 a.m. You will find it about 20 degrees east of Regulus in the constellation of Leo. At magnitude +1, the planet looks considerably less bright that it has been in recent years, owing to the fact that we are viewing the rings almost edge-on, so they reflect very little sunlight in our direction.

Uranus (magnitude 5.8) is a binocular object in the constellation of Aquarius, about three degrees northeast of Phi Aquarii (magnitude 4).

Neptune (magnitude 7.8), is a more challenging object in the constellation of Capricornus.

METEORS

The famous **Leonids**, which reach the peak of their activity on November 17th, will be badly affected by moonlight this year. About 20 meteors per hour would be expected under ideal conditions.

VARIABLE STAR: Algol

There are five minima of this **eclipsing binary** visible from the UK this month. They occur on November 9th (4.50 am), the 12th (1.35 am), the 14th (about 10.25 pm), the 17th (7.20 pm) and the 29th (6.30 am). The star dims from its normal brightness (magnitude 2.1) to magnitude 3.4 over a period of 4.8 hours.

11. Clarification of concessionary membership fee

Members aged under 18 years, full-time students, and members receiving Jobseeker's Allowance are entitled to pay the concessionary rate (currently £12.50).

For other adult members, the committee wishes to establish clarity of the rules on concessions. Committee has considered the options below and recommend option 1. At this AGM, members are invited to vote for the option of their choice. The option receiving the most votes will become the new rule for concessions for the Society's year from 1 October 2009.

- Option 1. The concessionary rate applies to members who receive the State Pension (at whatever age)
- Option 2. The concessionary rate applies to members aged 60 or over
- **Option 3.** The concessionary rate applies to members aged 65 or over
- Option 4. The concessionary rate is abolished for all adult members (except full time students and those on Jobseekers allowance). Adults pay full rate.
