TWO OF THE SMALLEST MOONS OF URANUS DISCOVERED

The International Astronomical Union announced on September 25th that the Hubble Space Telescope has discovered two new satellites of the planet Uranus. The new moons are about 8 to 10 miles across (12 to 16 km). They are so faint that they eluded detection by the Voyager 2 spacecraft, which discovered 10 small satellites when it flew by the planet in 1986. The newly detected moons are orbiting even closer to the planet than the five major Uranian satellites, which are several hundred miles wide. The two new satellites are the first inner moons of Uranus discovered from an Earth-based telescope in more than 50 years. Hubble telescope observations also helped to confirm the discovery of another tiny moon that had originally been detected in Voyager images.

Society news for October

Our October meeting will be held at the NAS Observatory on Thursday the 2nd – a good way to escape the Goose Fair traffic! Do please come out to our Observatory and do dress warmly, as the site can get very cold. The large telescope is not there yet, but we will have some smaller telescopes available and, weather permitting, plan to do some observing.

Observatory work

After a short delay to work on the dome shutter mechanism, things are starting to progress again. Everything we need will be either made or bought by mid-October. Two weekends will then be needed to install the mechanism. The first weekend will be devoted to the low-level work (installation of the motor/gearbox mechanism at the base of the dome), while the second weekend will focus on the high-level work (which needs tower scaffolding), plus putting right any glitches found during the first weekend.

Volunteers will be needed to help on these two weekends, so once we have confirmed the dates we will publicise them on the NAS Observatory Group website. The telescope is expected to be ready for installation soon after the shutter mechanism is completed. We should, at last, then have an operational observatory.

BAA Meeting in Nottingham, April 2004

One other item of news I am pleased to announce is the British Astronomical Association "Out of London" meeting which will be held in Nottingham on Saturday, 24 April 2004.

Plans for this meeting are still being made, but a venue in Nottingham has now been booked and I am looking forward to hearing from the BAA with details of the programme for the day. More about this nearer the date!

Sky Notes 2003 October

THE MOON

First Quarter 02d 19h 09m Full Moon 10d 07h 28m Last Quarter 18d 12h 32m New Moon 25d 12h 50m

THE PLANETS

Mercury can be seen, especially in binoculars, above the eastern horizon before dawn in the first week of this month (magnitude -1). The planet reaches superior conjunction on the 25^{th} .

Venus is moving away from the Sun in the evening sky, and by the end of the month will be at an eastern elongation of 20 degrees (magnitude -3.8).

Mars will continue to be a bright object low in the evening sky throughout October, although it will have faded to little brighter than magnitude –1 by the end of the month. (Remember, it was almost as bright as magnitude –3 in late August). Also by the end of October the angular diameter will be 15 arcseconds (down from 25 arcseconds only two months previously). Mars will be 1 degree north of the Moon on October 6th.

Jupiter is a morning object, moving away from the Sun in the pre-dawn sky. By the middle of the month it will be at magnitude -1.8, with an angular diameter of 32 arcseconds. Jupiter will be 4 degrees south of the Moon on the 22^{nd} .

Saturn will be rising at 21 hours by mid-October, and so will be visible for much of the night, magnitude approximately zero.

Uranus (magnitude 5.7) is visible in Aquarius and **Neptune** (magnitude 7.8) is in Capricornus. Both are evening objects.

METEORS

The **Orionids** are expected to reach their maximum activity on October 20th, with a zenithal hourly rate of 25.
