50th Birthday of the Space Age

Where were you when you heard the news of Sputnik One? (You will need to be well over fifty to answer that question). I was in bed on the morning of the 4th of October 1957 when my mother, having heard the headline on the 8 am or 9 am news on the BBC Home Service, burst into my room to announce, *The Russians have launched a satellite!* The news caused consternation and anxiety in the USA. American pride was hurt. People feared the threat of nuclear attack implied by the Soviet ability to send payloads across the globe on rockets that were much larger than any available in the West at that time. Barely a month later things got even worse when the Russians launched Sputnik Two, carrying an unfortunate dog, on November 3rd. If I remember correctly, the then Astronomer Royal, Richard Woolley, described space travel as "bilge". Now, of course, satellite technology is an indispensable part of everyday life, like microwave ovens, freezers and mobile phones.

British Summer Time ends on October 28th. Clocks go back one hour at 2 am.

PHASES OF THE MOON

This month's lunar phases all occur in the morning:

Last Quarter occurs on the morning of the 3rd New Moon occurs on the morning of the 11th First Quarter occurs on the morning of the 19th Full Moon occurs on the morning of the 26th

This month the Moon is closest to Earth on the 26th (so the Full Moon should look BIG – in fact it will be the largest Full Moon of 2007), and furthest from Earth on the 13th.

THE PLANETS

Mercury is not well-placed for northern hemisphere observers this month, and will be at inferior conjunction (between us and the Sun) on the 23rd.

Venus is a brilliant morning object (magnitude -4.3) and will reach greatest western elongation (46 degrees) on October 28th. Look for it in the southeast before dawn.

Mars is getting brighter week by week, being at magnitude -0.1 at the start of October, and magnitude -0.6 at the end. It rises mid-evening and remains visible for the rest of the night, in the constellation of Gemini. By the end of the month the planet's angular diameter will be 12 arcseconds.

You may be able, at the start of the month, to glimpse **Jupiter** low down in the southwest just after sunset, but its current apparition is now drawing to a close, particularly for observers in the northern hemisphere.

Saturn, is starting to reappear in the morning sky shortly before sunrise, but will not be well-placed for observation until later in the autumn.

Uranus (magnitude 5.7) is an evening object in the constellation of Aquarius, while **Neptune** (magnitude 7.8) is also an evening object, in the constellation of Capricornus.

METEORS

The Orionids should reach their maximum activity (about 25 events per hour) on October 20th. The best chances of seeing these meteors occur after midnight, by which time the 9 day-old Moon will be moving out of the way, leaving favourable conditions in the early morning. Orionids tend to be fast-moving, and leave visible trails.

VARIABLE STAR: Algol

There are five minima of the dark-eclipsing variable star Algol (Beta Persei) visible from the UK this month. They occur on October 1st (10.05 pm BST), the 16th (6.15 am), the 19th (3 am), the 21st (11.45 pm) and the 24th (8.35 pm). The star dims from its normal brightness (magnitude 2.1) to magnitude 3.4 over a period of about five hours.

INVITATION TO MEMBERS

Members of Nottingham Astronomical Society are warmly invited to attend, as the event will be reported in Council papers and will be a good opportunity to showcase the Society and its activities. Light refreshments will be served. A Coronado PST will be available for solar viewing (weather permitting). There will be a collection for the Mayor's charity - the Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance.

The opening of Sam's dome is not an official part of the Society's programme, but it is hoped that his observatory might form part of future members' evenings and other events as a complement to the Society's main observatory.
