Mars Odyssey

IMAGING MARS

The Hubble Space Telescope took its best-ever picture of Mars, within minutes of the planet's closest approach to Earth in nearly 60,000 years, on August 27th. At this time the Red Planet was 34,647,420 miles (55,757,930 km) from Earth. Mars reaches opposition about every 26 months, but the special significance of this year's event is seen when we consider the closest approaches in 2001 (43 million miles), 1999 (54 million miles), 1997 (60 million miles) and 1995 (65 million miles). Not until 2287 will Mars again be as close as it has been this year.

There is still plenty of time to observe Mars this month. Although it is now receding from us (because Earth has "overtaken" Mars in its orbit) it will be visible at earlier times in the evening as the autumn progresses.

THE PLANETS

Mercury. Greatest western elongation takes place on 27 September, when Mercury will be 18° from the Sun and 16° above the eastern horizon at sunrise. This is **the most favourable time to observe this planet in the whole of 2003**. Mercury can be seen in binoculars for about 10 days either side of this date.

Venus is practically unobservable this month, having only just emerged from superior conjunction.

Mars continues to be the gem of the night sky throughout September, and you will be able to see it earlier in the evening as the month progresses. At the beginning of the month the magnitude will be -2.8, but by the end of the month it will have faded to -2. The Moon is less than 5° away from Mars on the evening of the 9th. At the end of September Mars will be 4° south of Uranus.

Jupiter. It will be possible to catch a glimpse of Jupiter in the pre-dawn sky by the end of the month. It will be 29° from the Sun and located on the underside of Leo. The diameter will be 32 arcseconds and the magnitude -1.7.

Saturn is coming back into view this month, shining at magnitude 0.1. By late September the planet rises at 22:15 and is visible for at least six hours in a dark sky. The rings are now closing, and a sliver of the planet's northern hemisphere is beginning to show above the rings.

Uranus (magnitude 5.7) is visible in Aquarius and **Neptune** (magnitude 7.8) is in Capricornus.
