THE MOON

Full Moon 8d 20h 37m Last Quarter 16d 17h 43m New Moon 23d 09h 43m First Quarter 30d 10h 03m

THE PLANETS

Mercury is at greatest eastern elongation (21°) on the 9th, and so may be glimpsed low in the evening sky after sunset during the first couple of weeks of the month. However, this apparition is more favourable to southern hemisphere observers as the planet is 25° south of the celestial equator.

Venus is also an evening object, and although much easier to observe than Mercury, will nevertheless be very low in the sky, being only 10° above the horizon at sunset at the end of the month. (Greatest eastern elongation does not occur until late March).

Mars continues to fade, reaching magnitude zero this month, but also climbs higher in the sky as it moves from Aquarius into Pisces. The planet will continue to be visible throughout most of the evening, and although its angular diameter will have fallen to 9 arcseconds by Christmas, it will be the focus of renewed interest with the arrival of Mars Express at that time.

Jupiter is a brilliant object in the morning sky, reaching magnitude -2.2 before the end of the month. It will be 3° south of the Moon on the 16th.

Saturn is a prominent object (magnitude -0.4) in the constellation of Gemini. It reaches opposition on New Year's Eve. Saturn will be 5° south of the Moon on the 10th.

Uranus (magnitude 5.8) is an evening object, a few degrees north of iota Aquarii, and visible through binoculars all month.

Neptune (magnitude 7.9) in Capricornus, is very difficult to observe this month.

METEORS

This is the month of the **Geminids**, probably the most consistent of the annual showers. The meteors are slow and bright, and therefore excellent objects for photography. The maximum (possibly 100 per hour) occurs on December 14^{th} , but the meteors may be observed from the 7^{th} to the 16^{th} . Late evening should be the best time to make observations.

25th December 2003 A Christmas Day landing on Mars for Beagle 2

If all goes as planned, the timetable for the Beagle 2 landing is as follows:

25th December:

- 02:54 GMT: Beagle 2 lands on Mars
- 03:00 GMT: Mars Express orbital insertion
- 05:15 GMT: Mars Odyssey orbiter flies over Beagle 2 first possible signal retrieval from the lander
- 07:00 GMT: First evaluation of Mars Express orbital insertion
- 22:45 GMT: Possible direct capture of Beagle 2 signals at Jodrell Bank Observatory
